

This year began on an extremely positive note; with a new management team in place, and a whole host of bespoke training courses for both teaching staff and management, there was a lot going on at the start. As the year progressed, teachers had the opportunity to attend a variety of PD sessions being organized and presented by Train-the-Trainer trainees. In March, the department received its official approval to be called an "English Language Institute", which is an exceptional accomplishment for the University.

The library has now been stocked with books pertaining to English Language Teaching, for teachers to use as resources to help plan lessons. The Learning and Resources Center is now fully operational, and students are invited to take part in the activities and clubs being run there.

The end of the first semester demonstrated that student success was a key part of the success of the program; as the pass rate overall reached 80%. The end of the second semester is coming soon, and the overall pass rate is expected to be a lot higher.

Looking forward, next academic year. the ELI expects to be accredited by the EAQUALS committee for Educational Accreditation in Europe, making the ELI the first internationally accredited program for women in a postsecondary institution.

### ELI Pride: Learning and Resource Center by Manal Almebki

With over 100 students joined in, The learning and recource center runs five different clubs which are Conversation Cafe, Skills, Literacy, Media and Self Development. These clubs cater for the talents and interests of our students. Our main goal is to provide students with a structured and supportive space to awaken their interests, develop their talents, improve their language and nurture their passion. The majority of sessions are games and activity based which allow all students to participate no matter their level. Students meet for a one-hour session with academic professionals who provide support and guidance throughout the semester.

Most students join the clubs because they get a chance to meet new people and practice English in a relaxed and informal environment. In short, English clubs are a very valuable part of the English language student experience.

The closing ceremony for the center was delightful It started with a treasure hunt that was organized by the clubs supervisors. The hunt was followed by a poem written and read by one of the members. Later, the members introduced their corners, and certificates were handed out in the presence of our dean. There was an obvious harmony between our students and their supervisors which can seen by any observer. This was apparent in the overall atmosphere.

# ELI reads: Reflecting on Your Teaching Year

At the end of another school year, it's tempting to count the days left, wave goodbye to my class, pack up my room, and mentally check out for the summer. I've earned it, haven't I? But as the year winds down, I'm reminded that many of the end-of-year activities I do with my students incorporate some sort of reflection on the year:

- What did you enjoy learning about the most this year?
- Did you achieve the hope and dream you set for yourself in September?
- What will you remember most about third grade?

We encourage our students to reflect on the year and their growth, so shouldn't we as teachers do the same? Whether you've had a challenging year, a dream class that you know you'll remember for years, or a year of ups and downs, I encourage you to reflect on the following things:

#### Celebrate the successes

When you look back over the year, what stands out? Whether it's the amount of academic progress your students made, a personal connection you made with a particular student, a specific lesson or unit that went better than it ever has before, or something new you tried for the first time in your teaching, take the time to acknowledge your role in those successes.

#### Appreciate the struggles

One year I had a particularly challenging class. I worked all year on trying to find solutions to the issues that were affecting our classroom community. I planned Morning Meeting activities to try to build student relationships, used role plays to teach how to respectfully interact with each other, and held problem-solving conferences and class meetings with students. At the end of the year, I was tired—but I realized that in tackling the class issues, I had strengthened my use of these teaching practices and added even more tools to my repertoire.

#### Set a goal for next year

I had a third grader this year who constantly used the phrase "next time" when she reflected on her work. "Next time I want to try writing a story with more characters," "Next time I think I'll add more labels to my drawing." Reflecting and setting a "next time" goal is an important part of professional growth. Did you try something new this year that you want to refine next year? Do have an idea about how to teach a concept differently next year? Do you want to put your focus on a specific area of your teaching? Take a moment to envision what you'd like to do "next time."




